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AUP Changes for BYOT

1. Look for prohibitions.
2. Think through restrictions.
 - a. Who can approve proper use.
 - b. What equipment is compatible
 - c. Are there areas you are not going to allow use?



AUP Changes for BYOT

3. Are there additions you need?
 - a. Making sure devices are charged.
 - b. IT Support for the number of devices that will be in the school.



AUP Changes for BYOT

4. Records Retention Issues
5. Mix of Personal and School Information on Same Device
6. Security of Information
7. Expectation of Privacy/Discipline
8. Liability Issues



Is Simpler Better?

A. Advantages to Comprehensive Policy

1. Rules are gathered in one place.
2. Provides required notices.
3. Use in employee and student discipline.
4. Advantages to single signed document.

B. Disadvantages

1. Long
2. Convoluted
3. No one actually reads it
4. Often out of date



Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

- A. Linked to E-rate

- B. Must certify that you have:
 - 1. Internet Safety policy that includes technology protections measures.



Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

2. Protection measures must block or filter access to pictures that are:
 - a. obscene
 - b. child pornography
 - c. harmful to minors

- C. Must adopt and enforce a policy to monitor online activities of minors.



Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

C. Internet Safety Policy must address:

1. Access by minors to inappropriate matter.
2. The safety and security of minors when using electronic mail, chat rooms and other forms of direct electronic communications.



Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

3. Unauthorized access and other unlawful activities by minors.
4. Unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal information regarding minors.
5. Measures restricting minors' access to materials harmful to them.



Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

- D. Beginning with FY 2012, the school's Internet Safety Policy provides for the education of minors about appropriate online behavior, including interacting with other individuals on social networking websites and in chat rooms and cyberbullying awareness and response.



Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA)

- A. Operators of websites or online services
 - 1. Directed to children under 13
 - 2. Actual knowledge that they are collecting personal information from children under 13.



Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA)

1. Parental notice
2. Parental consent
3. Confidentiality and security requirements
